A Word From the Mayor

Dundee is a fabulous place to live, and it is getting better all the time!

The Dundee Paddle launch is now open. You can circumnavigate Ash Island and see all kinds of wildlife and enjoy a peaceful afternoon on the Willamette River. We also have several wonderful parks and trails. Our newest park, the Viewmont Greenway Park, is destined to become part of the Yamhelas Trail System. Plans are currently in place to develop a trail system from Newberg to Haag Lake. It will require additional funding and public support to reach fruition, but it is well on its way. The Viewmont Greenway Park will connect trails running along the Dundee Bypass to the Harvey Creek Trail which will then connect to other trails. Bids for the first phase of our downtown streetscape improvements will be going out soon. These improvements will include sidewalks and curbs in the downtown core with inlaid Dundee City logos, increased storm water capacity and management systems, and installation of conduits to put utilities underground.

These improvements will make Dundee more walkable and beautiful. They will also make Dundee more attractive to developers. The installation of these items will help reduce property development costs in Dundee. Most of the funds for these improvements are from State and Federal Grants making them an even greater benefit to the residents of Dundee. We have also received a commitment to receive a free “Jelly Fish” storm water management unit as part of a test program. This unit has a value of approximately \$50,000, and uniquely solves a complicated storm water issue the city faces as part of the streetscape improvement project.

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Rate Increase for Sewer and Storm Drain Effective August 1, 2015

On June 2, City Council approved rate changes for sewer and storm water services effective August 1. Water rates will not change. The new rates were adopted to keep pace with the operational cost of the utilities and to satisfy loan obligations.

About 58% of the sewer fee revenues are obligated to the repayment of the \$9.7 million DEQ State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan used to finance the construction of the new \$13.5 million wastewater treatment plant. Since the start of operations in October 2012, the actual costs for operating and maintaining the new facilities are better defined. The City crews have responded admirably in learning to maintain a very complex facility, but special thanks goes to WWTP Operator Todd Miller for his constant diligence to ensure the facility performs within the limits of our discharge permit. The following table shows the changes in the monthly base and volume sewer charges for all classes:

The storm water monthly fee will change from \$5.00 to \$5.50 for residential uses, with a proportionate increase to non-residential uses based on their total impervious surface areas. This is the first increase to the storm water fee since it was first adopted in 1997. The Dundee 2006 Storm Water Facility Master Plan will be updated this year, and will reflect projects that will implement Dundee's obligations under the Willamette Basin Total Maximum Daily Load Management Plan as mandated by DEQ. This means the City will plan the construction of storm water treatment facilities to limit pollutants from reaching the Willamette River. We will also update the list of recommended storm water piping projects, with priority given to addressing localized flooding during sustained storm events.

The table below compares combined monthly water and sewer charges for the ten cities in Yamhill County. The winter and summer averages represent typical residential customer use in Dundee.

Utility Bills Get a Makeover

Your next utility bill will have a new look!

On July 1, the City of Dundee went “live” with a new utility billing software program from Caselle. The transition is the first step in being able to offer online payments and online account access, features we expect to have implemented by January 1, 2016. The new billing format is now a full size sheet of paper and will be mailed in an envelope.

The new format will allow us to print more information about your account history and how charges are being accrued, as well as printing a graph for visual comparison of water consumption. An additional change will be with regard to how delinquent bills are noticed. No longer will a pink slip be sent notifying you of past due charges and potential shut off dates. This information will now be printed on your statement.

Included with your next bill will be a request for updated account information. For your benefit and ours, please fill out the Account Information Update Form and return it with your payment. Many of you are long- time residents and in those years landline phones have been transitioned to cell phones, emergency contacts are no longer valid, and we’d love to have email addresses on file as an additional means of contact. Although it does not happen often, there have been instances where geysers erupt in yards, water pours out from garages, and trees fall on houses. If you are not home and the telephone numbers we have for you are disconnected, it is quite difficult for us to let you know before you come home to water having been shut off or an unexpected disaster.

City Projects Updates

Water Master Plan Update

CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. is assisting the City of Dundee with an update to the 2003 Water Master Plan. The update will 1) identify and address deficiencies in water supply, storage and distribution; 2) plan and budget for both needed repairs and capital improvements to the City's water system over a 20-year planning horizon; and 3) develop a new water system development charge methodology to ensure future development pays its fair share of water system capacity improvements. On August 4 the consultant will present recommendations to the City Council regarding water system improvements and the establishment of a new pressure zone for the Riverside District area. The presentation starts at 7:00 pm at the Fire Station Community Meeting Room and is open to the public.

Well Construction

Conversion of the 2005 test well into production is underway following bid award to Stettler Supply and Construction in the amount of \$457,168. In addition to the well improvements, the project includes installation of a third booster pump and new pump controls at the clear well, and telemetry improvements. This project is expected to be completed by October. The production of the well is estimated at 250 gallons per minute, and will accommodate new development for the next ten years or more.

Solar Installation

A 100 kW solar system was installed at the Wastewater Treatment Plant and began generating power in May. In the first month of operation the solar system generated 16,425 kW hours, representing about 20% of that month's consumption at the WWTP. The system was installed at no cost to the City as part of the net-metering solar incentive program offered by PGE. The owner of the system, PGPV LLC, will receive incentive payments from PGE and the City will receive a guaranteed benefit of \$5,000 per year over the next fifteen years.

ODOT Presentation

ODOT will present the final plans for the river and hills design of the aesthetic features that will be attached to the Bypass bridge crossing the railroad and Highway 99W south of Dundee at the July 21 City Council meeting.

Parks Advisory Committee Seeks Member

The Dundee Parks Advisory Committee (PAC) currently has a vacant position. The PAC generally meets the first Wednesday of each month and provides recommendations to the City Council on the trails, parks, and other facilities related to the implementation of the Dundee Parks and Open Space Plan. City of Dundee 2015 Water Quality Report

We are very pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Quality Water Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our water source is deep wells. This report shows our water quality and what it means.

We are proud to report that the City of Dundee's drinking water is safe and exceeds all state and federal requirements.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Alan Mustain, Public Works Superintendent, at 503-538-6700. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility.

In the following table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Non-Detects (ND) - Laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per trillion (ppt) or Nanograms per liter (nanograms/l) - One part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

Parts per quadrillion (ppq) or Picograms per liter (picograms/l) - One part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - Picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Millirems per year (mrem/yr) - Measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Million Fibers per Liter (MFL) - Million fibers per liter is a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Maximum Contaminant Level - (mandatory language) The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - (mandatory language) The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below, which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - Nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Action Level - The concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

As you can see by the table, our system had no violations. We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some constituents have been detected. The EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. YOUR WATER SYSTEM

Where does our water come from?

All of the City's water comes from groundwater sources. Our wells are located around the city and in the city's watershed located in the hills outside city limits. Water is pumped from 9 wells that pump to 3 reservoirs. Each reservoir supplies water to different pressure zones.

How is water treated?

Water from the well-fields is of high quality. The only additive to our water is chlorine. It is not filtered or treated in any other manner.

What tests are run on the water?

Tests are done on a weekly basis at a certified lab for coliform bacteria. Each source (well-field) is tested annually for nitrates. Every three years testing is done on more than 80 in-organic, volatile organic, and synthetic organic compounds. Every four years testing is done for radiological contaminants. All required testing is done by independent, certified laboratories.


Tip-a-Cop

Safety Town

The Newberg-Dundee Police Department and Chehalem Park and Recreation District have shared a wonderful partnership to benefit children's safety in our community since 2007 when they began Safety Town. Safety Town was first implemented August 13 – 17, 2007 and has continued each summer to provide kids in our area an opportunity to learn and practice important safety information in a fun and interactive environment.



Safety Town is a five-day safety camp for children who will be going into kindergarten and 1st grade in the fall. Kids spend three hours learning important safety concepts, and putting their knowledge into practice. Safety concepts are reinforced through music, and arts and crafts. Some of the highlights include a bicycle safety course; fire safety; and a 9-1-1 simulation where kids can practice what to do and say. Kids will also have an opportunity to "drive" through Safety Town, practicing the proper way to wear their helmets and seatbelts and also practicing pedestrian safety.

Dundee Fire Department Needs Volunteers

To be a volunteer member of the Dundee Fire Department, you must be at least 18 years of age and either live or work in the Dundee Fire District. New untrained members are required to attend and successfully complete the Yamhill County Basic Firefighter Recruit Academy or equivalent training. The academy is offered in the spring and fall each year.

The Dundee Fire Department protects the city and rural area of Dundee totaling 13 square miles. In 2014 the Fire Department responded to 675 calls for service, which ranged from general medical, motor vehicle crashes, vehicle fires, structure fires, wildland/brush fires, hazardous material spills, mutual aid and public assist.

There are many other community activities the Volunteer Firefighters take pride in. Among them are fire education / prevention, safety inspections, Christmas toy and joy and miscellaneous community social events which is highlighted each year by the All You Can Eat Pancake Feed, which has been a tradition since 1960.

Burn Ban Set for Yamhill County, Portions of Polk County

The Yamhill County Fire Defense Board, in cooperation with the Oregon Department of Forestry, has enacted a Burn Ban within Yamhill County. The Burn Ban covers all burning including, but not limited to, the following situations:

1. Individuals normally allowed to backyard burn
2. Individuals normally allowed to burn agricultural waste
3. Individuals with a Hardship Permit issued by DEQ

The burn ban does not include recreational burning (backyard fire pits). Individuals intending to burn in this manner should always exercise caution with fire sources.

Individuals found burning during the burn ban may be issued a citation and/or found liable for any property loss damage and suppression costs resulting from a burning incident. The burn ban will remain in effect until significant rains and cooler temperatures minimize the fire danger in the fall.

Reducing Food Waste

Food waste is the single largest component of our waste stream. The average US household throws away one quarter of all of the food that they purchase. According to the National Resources Defense Council, this waste is the equivalent of \$165 billion each year and consumes 25 percent of all freshwater and huge amounts of chemicals, energy, and land.

We can all help to prevent waste by making small changes in the way we purchase, store and prepare food.

- * Shop Smart
 - o Check your pantry, cupboards, fridge and freezer for ingredients you already have before you go shopping
 - o Make a shopping list and stick to it
 - o Include quantities on your shopping list to only buy what you need
- * Eat What You Purchase
 - o Move food that is likely to spoil soon to the front of fridge
 - o Utilize leftovers to make soups, smoothies, sandwiches and baked dishes
 - o Plan meals around the items you already have that may spoil soon
- * Store Foods Properly
 - o Store onions, garlic and potatoes in a dark place (in the pantry or in a paper bag)
 - o Add a dry paper towel or piece of paper bag to plastic bags of lettuce, spinach or other greens. The paper towel will absorb moisture and keeps greens fresh longer.
 - o Freeze food that won't be eaten soon
