



## Dundee's Quarantine Ordinance *Written by Melody Osborne*

The first case of Spanish Influenza arrived in Oregon on October 3, 1918. A soldier, on his way to Texas for training, wasn't feeling well and went to a Portland hospital where he was diagnosed with Spanish flu. He was sent to a military hospital in Vancouver. On October 5, 1918, the Oregon Journal reported that no cases had appeared in Oregon, however that day a new rule was put in place that anyone who coughed or sneezed in a public theater would be asked to leave. It was the first step of many to try and control the spread of a disease that would ultimately claim anywhere from 50 to 100 million lives worldwide. Four days later, a handful of cases appeared at an army training school and Portland began bracing for the epidemic. Within a few days a small number of suspected cases began to crop up around the city and state and local officials were advised by the Oregon Board of Health that all schools, churches, and places of public amusement were to be closed immediately upon the appearance of the epidemic in their cities. Over the next three months, several different actions would be taken to try and stop the spread of the virus. Educational information would be distributed, different mitigation measures would take place such as removing windows from all street cars to discourage use and also to ventilate and

teachers unable to work in the classroom, would be put to work as influenza educators. For a little while, the measures seemed to work and as cases continued to go down Oregon cities would reopen from their closures. Unfortunately, there would only be a brief respite before cases would begin to rise again. This rise in cases would finally prompt Portland's Mayor to issue a quarantine ordinance. On December 11, the Mayor drafted a resolution calling for the complete quarantine of all suspected cases and family members. Unlike today, where health privacy is assured, in 1918 a home with an infected person of influenza would have a notice posted on their residence notifying any would be visitors that they could be fined if they decided to stop by, as well as letting the residents know that they could be both fined and faced with jail time if they left.



It is an unfortunate truth that the City of Dundee has been unable to locate City Council minutes from that time period, so I cannot tell you how the city officials decided to adopt a similar quarantine ordinance. Nor have I been able to locate information about cases that may have occurred in Dundee, which may have instigated the need. But we can share Dundee's quarantine Ordinance. It's a unique look back in time to a similar situation we are living through today, but with a very different means of trying to mitigate the spread.

## Dundee's Quarantine Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 26.

An Ordinance providing for a quarantine of contagious and infectious diseases within the Town of Dundee, Oregon, providing a method of closing all churches, schools, clubs, theatres, lodges and all other public gatherings and prohibiting all private entertainments during an epidemic, providing a penalty for violation of this ordinance and declaring an emergency.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF DUNDEE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:---

Section 1:- Whenever any person residing within the corporate limits of the Town of Dundee, Oregon, shall be afflicted with a contagious disease, the physician in attendance shall forthwith notify the Recorder of said town of such fact, specifying the name of the person so afflicted and the name of the disease from which such person is suffering.

Immediately upon receipt of such notice, the said Recorder shall cause the Marshal of said Town to post a quarantine notice upon the house where such person resides.

Section 2:- Whenever any quarantine notice shall have been posted upon any premises pursuant to this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person residing in any house so quarantined to leave said quarantined premises until such quarantine shall have been legally removed,

Section 3:- Whenever any quarantine notice shall have been posted upon any premises in said town, it shall be unlawful for any person to enter the house so quarantined until such quarantine shall have been lawfully removed, except that the physician in charge and the attending nurse shall be permitted to enter such house in the discharge of their duties.

Section 4:- When, in the opinion of the attending physician, all danger of contagion from any particular premises shall have passed, such physician shall notify the Recorder of such fact and the Recorder shall at once cause the quarantine notices posted upon said premises to be removed.

Section 5:- Whenever, in the opinion of the council of said town, any contagious disease shall have reached such proportions as to be epidemic in said town, the said council may, by an order duly entered upon its

minutes, close all churches, schools, lodges, clubs and all other public gatherings and private entertainments and parties, notice of which said order shall be given by posting copies of said order in three public places in said town, and thereafter it shall be unlawful for any of the places specified in such order, to open, meet or entertain as the case may be.

Section 6:- Whenever, in the opinion of the council of said town, any epidemic has passed the stage of danger to the community, such council may, by an order duly entered upon its minutes, remove the ban on public and private gatherings notice of such order being given by posted notices thereof in three public and conspicuous places in said town.

Section 7:- The term "public gatherings" as used in this ordinance, shall be construed to mean any gathering at which more than five people are present.

Section 8:- During the continuance of any epidemic as herein provided, the council may, by an order duly entered upon its minutes, regulate the number of people who shall be and remain in any store or other public place in said town and shall give notice thereof by posting copies of such order in three public places in said town.

Section 9:- Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof before the Recorder, shall be punished by payment of a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00 or not less than 2 days nor more than 10 days in the town jail.

Section 10:- Whereas, several cases of Spanish Influenza have appeared in and about said town and there is danger that said disease may become epidemic, it is necessary that this ordinance should become immediately effective: therefore an emergency is hereby declared and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the mayor.

Passed the council this 18th day of January, 1919.



## Delinquency Fees to Resume

Following the steep economic decline last March due to the State of Oregon’s efforts to slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus, the City Council suspended water service disconnection for delinquent accounts though the end of June 2020. Although the City waived the fees associated with 24-Hour Notices and Shut-Offs, the delinquent account collection procedures as outlined in Dundee Municipal Code section 13.04.070 were re-instated in July. Starting in October, the \$25.00 24-hour doorhanger delinquent account notice fee and the \$25.00 water reconnection fee charges will resume. 

## Anatomy of a Water Leak

During the months of April to October, residents are billed an irrigation rate for sewer consumption. To calculate this, water use for December to February is averaged and locked in as the summer sewer consumption rate. Since water rates are much lower than sewer rates, and because water usage goes up during the summer, leaks can often go undetected until November when regular billing resumes. Although we try to identify abnormal consumption, if the leak has been ongoing the excess consumption does not always show up on the exceptions report. If you believe you have a water leak, or want to make sure you do *not*, below are instructions on how to check.

### How to check for a water leak.

Here is quick guide to checking for a water leak in your house, it doesn't cover all the scenarios but a few. Quick note: it is the homeowner's responsibility to repair water leaks between the meter and the house (as well as anything inside the home).

First, we need to identify the meter that goes to your house, most meters are located at the corner of your property (although some are not) and are contained in a box with a lid that looks something like this, although there are different versions.



Then, we open the box and find our meter and they typically look like these shown below.



The meters indicate water moving through them in two ways, the digital meters have a "+" with a circle around it flashing and the numbers change, the older analog meters have a small black triangle or a small red dial that spins and you can watch the numbers change as well.


If you see the indicators moving or numbers changing and you know that nobody is using water in the house then you probably have a leak.

First thing to do is confirm that all of your water is shut off, then check the meter again, if it's still moving you most likely have a leak if not, then "woo hoo" no leak.


One of the most likely causes of leaks is the toilet. They are pretty sneaky. They let water out without you even seeing it, and only when the water falls below a certain level will you hear it filling. If it's a slow leak, this means that it may only be filling 2-3 times a day without you realizing it. The best way to catch these leaks is to pull the tank lid off the back and listen for the sound of water moving, or by also looking at the bowl fill tube and see if there is water going in to that. Another way to check for a toilet leak is to put food coloring (or some other dye) in the tank in the evening. In the morning, see if it has shown up in the bowl. If so, this means your Flush Valve Seat is leaking.



If your toilets are fine, the next location to check is the service line coming from the meter. Most homes have a shut off valve that turns water off to the house. It can typically be found in the garage, but sometimes they are located under a sink or even under your toilet. This handle/knob will look different from all the others.



If your house has a shut off valve, turn the water off in the house and then go outside to look at the meter. If the meter is still turning, this indicates that water is escaping from the service line somewhere between the meter and the house. Check the yard for muddy spots or a location where the grass is wet on a dry day.



Finally, check your irrigation system. They can be pesky as well since they will usually only have a leak when they are activated. So again, look for overly wet areas and make sure they are deactivated and winterized when not using them.

With all the ash that has fallen from the wildfires in Oregon, we wanted to take this moment to reassure you that chances of ash getting into Dundee's water system are very slim. Dundee's water comes from underground wells and is stored in covered reservoirs. Dundee's water remains safe to drink.

## Street Sweeping

Leaf season is here and as fall gets into full swing, we would like to remind you to not blow your yard debris into the street. Depositing leaves into the street is a violation of Dundee Municipal Code Section 8.08.030 and subject to fines. Yard debris should be picked up and placed in your yard debris bin.

The sweeper is scheduled for the third week of the month and after trash day. Extra sweeping is also scheduled during the first week of November and December, weather permitting.




## Dundee Fire Department Holiday Parade

## Despite Distance Learning NDPD Partnership With Schools Continues

## Newberg School District Seeks Bond to Replace Dundee Elementary School

On August 11, 2020, the Newberg School Board voted to place a construction bond on the November 3, 2020 ballot. If approved, these bonds will allow the district to improve health and safety in our schools, update classrooms and learning environments, improve technology, provide needed maintenance, upgrade Career and Technical Education classrooms at the high school to cutting edge facilities, make substantial improvements to Edwards Elementary School, and replace Dundee Elementary School.

At this time, a decision has not been made regarding whether a new school will be built on the existing property or if a new location will be pursued. Below is a *summarized* version of the Fact Sheet.

## Newberg School Bond Fact Sheet

### How much is the total bond, and what will it do?

If Bond Measure 36-205 passes, the school district will sell up to \$141 million in construction bonds, to be paid back by property taxes over a 30 year period. These bonds will allow the district to improve health and safety in our schools, update classrooms and learning environments, improve technology, provide needed maintenance, upgrade Career and Technical Education (CTE) to cutting edge facilities, and replace Dundee Elementary school.

### How will it affect my taxes?

Measure 36-205 is estimated to cost \$1.52 per \$1,000 of assessed value (not real market value), compared to the 2019-2020 rate of \$0.81/\$1,000 of assessed value, an increase of 71 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. From 2004 to 2018, the rate for Newberg School District bonds varied between \$2.74 and \$4.05 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The average home in the district will be around \$225,000 of assessed value next year, which would be an average increase of \$175.50 per year if the measure passes.

### Why replace a building when we aren't even meeting in schools?

Buildings have a life span of about 70 years, and the district has 10 schools. Even replacing one building every 10 years means each building is only replaced once every 100 years. The Bond Development Committee felt it was essential to be good stewards of the tax payer investment in our buildings, and not get too far behind schedule by not replacing a building.

### Will improvements happen at every school?

Yes. Each school will see health and safety improvements to entries, protecting against disease and improving safety. Flexible learning space will be improved at each school, allowing small groups and collaboration to facilitate best learning practices. Across the district, improvements to air quality and heating and cooling (HVAC) systems will occur.
